Shorter, 36, resided in the city 17 years before he moved away to attend college at the age of 19. But, once again, he'll make the trip from his home in Colorado to Middletown for Sunday's Classic.

It's more than Shorter's son," Shorter writes in his soon-to-be-released book "Olympic Gold: A Runner's Life and Times." "I'm proud of that because I have fond memories of the place and its people."

marathon in 1972 - the first American in over 50 years to do it - and took second in 1976 despite a painful foot injury. He had hoped to try for another medal in that event this summer, but a stress fracture of his right foot caused him to abandon that attempt.

So Shorter has made it his goal to land a spot on the U.S. team by finishing in the top three at 10,000 meter Olympic trials June 19 in Los Angeles.

"The way I look at it, the three berths in the 10,000 are

Shorter plans to use the Classic as a tune-up before the trials.

"It's too bad the trials won't be in Middletown," said Shorter, who has run some of his best races here.

In his first visit to Middletown since his Olympic victory, Shorter won the 1981 Classic in 29:32, beating Bill Rodgers by nine seconds. The following year, Shorter won in 29:18, finishing 21 seconds ahead of runnerup Rod Dixon.

Shorter was almost forced to withdraw from last year's Classic because of tendinitis in his left foot near the ankle.


"I notified the race officials that I'd come down with an injury, in case they no longer wanted me," Shorter said. "But they insisted I come. If it was any other race I wouldn't have run. There is no way I could ever run as slowly as I did again."

Shorter's fondest memories are of Classic I.

"It was the perfect mat-chup," he said. "Bill and me. Both of us fit; both of us ready. And the added impetus of Middletown. It was more pressure than I've ever felt for any race since the '76 Olympics. I had to win even my grandmother was out there watching.

"It felt strange, almost eerie, to be running through Middletown again. To run from the Orange County Fairgrounds near Middletown High down Main Street, past the Thrall Library where I'd spent many afternoons, up over Highland Avenue two blocks from our old big house, around the periphery of Fancher-Davidge Park, where I used to ride my bike and fish, and back through the other side of town to the fairgrounds finish. More memories were stored there than I can possibly handle in one morning.

"With a mile or so to go I surged, felt an advantage, and pulled away. What a boost that was! It was one of those races in which two guys go at it until one guy breaks. To me, those are the most fun especially if I'm not the guy who breaks."

Dixon returns to try again

MIDDLETOWN - Rod Dixon might still be on the track circuit if not for the New Zealand boycott of the 1980 Olympic Games.

It wasn't until the spring of 1980, with his hopes for a second Olymlic medal dashed, that Dixon came to the United States and entered his first road race - the Philadelphia Diet Pepsi 10K. He finished third behind Gary Fanelli and Bill Rodgers.

In his next eight road races, Dixon was victorious seven times. He won the Philadelphia Distance Classic (13.1 miles), the Falmouth, Mass., Runoff (7.1 miles), the Lynchburg, Va., 10-miler and the New Orleans Muscular Dyswhere he 10K, trophy defeated Craig Virgin.

He closed out the season with a third-place finish at the Diet Pepsi 10K national championships in New York City in July. In just a few short months, Dixon had earned the Track and Field News' No. 1 ranking in races up to a distance of 10 miles.

"My success in races three vears ago made it obvious to me that I was more suited to road racing than for the track," said Dixon, who won the bronze medal in the 1,500 meters in the 1972 Olympic Games and was fourth in the 5,000 meter in 1976.

But if New Zealand hadn't joined in boycotting the 1980 Moscow Olympics, Dixon probably would have never taken to the roads.

In 1981, Dixon won 16 of the 20 races he entered. One of the races he did not win was the Orange Classic 10K, finishing second 21 seconds behind Frank Shorter.

"Dixon may have been the better runner at the time," said Shorter, "but I was emotionally peaked. I'd watched him compete two weeks before in Portland, Orego, and saw that he didn't run especially well downhills. My plan was to run the downhills hard and try to get a bit of a lead to work with. That's what happened.

"Rod was gracious in defeat, saying he underestimated me. I'm sure he was bothered by the heat (both the temperature and humidity



Musyoki completed hilly, 6.2-mile layout in 28:51, shattering the old mark of 29:18.4 set by Shorter the year before. His time was somewhat surprising since he had not run competitively in over a month.

"It was very good race," recalled Musyoki, 2,625, including Shorter and attended the University of Texas at El Paso and won three NCAA titles indoor three-mile twice and the outdoor 10K once.

"I normally don't like to set the pace. But the day was hot and someone had to do it. I looked behind once and couldn't see anyone. I was happy with my time."

George Buckheit of Bardonia matched Musyoki stride for stride for 21/2 miles before Musyoki began to pull away. Musyoki enjoyed a 300-yard advantage over Buckheit at the finish.

This year's race will provide a stronger challenge to Musyoki with no less than seven world-class racers entered. Musyoki is said to be in excellent shape, though he has been racing lightly this

He finished second in the Crescent City Classic in New Orleans in 27:28, and also recorded a good time (27:45) in the San Antonio College 10K on April 28 and at the Texas Relays, where he was clocked in 28:06 in the 10,000 meters on a track.

The 27-year-old Musyoki is another in the tradition of oustanding African runners who have come to the United States to attend college and compete in track, cross-coun-



Best field ever in Orange Classic

MIDDLETOWN — The fourth annual Orange Classic 10K is shaping up as the run to end all runs.

No less than seven world-class athletes, including Rod Dixon, the winner of the New York City Marathon, have

entered Sunday's race.

"We were really concerned with this being an Olympic year we'd have trouble attracting a strong field," said race coordinator John Szefc. "But we've received more inquiries than ever before. We've reached the limit."

Dixon, 33, heads the field of elite runners. The native of Auckland, New Zealand, had a string of 20 consecutive victories going into the May 20 Bay-to-Breakers 7.6 mile run in San Francisco. Dixon had not competed in a race prior to that since his victory in the New York City Marathon, but was reportedly in excellent shape after training all winter in New Zealand.

Among Dixon's strongest challengers are Michael Musyoki, a native of Kenya now living in El Paso, Texas, who was the second-ranked runner in the world last year, and winner of the 1983 Classic in course record time (28:51); local favorite Frank Shorter, a former Middletown resident now living in Boulder Springs, Colo., and the winner of the first two Classics; and Paul Cummings of Provo, Utah, a former world record holder in the half-marathon.

Also entered is David Long of Great Britain, ranked 44th in the world last year. Long finished 16th in the 1983 New York City Marathon. His best time in the 10K is 28:38, which he accomplished in the Run For Health in Philadelphia in March, 1983.

Also running will be George Buckheit of nearby Bardonia, who finished second to Musyoki last year, and Gary Fanelli, who was third in the 1982 Classic.

"We've tried to put together the most representative field possible," said Szefc, who noted that the Classic is regarded as one of the top 130 road races in the world. "We've got Dixon, who is a good bet to win a medal in the marathon at the Olympic Games; Musyoki, who won last year; Shorter,


who won twice before and knows the course, and Cummings, who was second to Dixon in last year's Pepsi Nationals.

"It's by far the best field we've ever had for a men's race," Szefc added. "We have four top-notch runners and three strong people right behind them."

Unfortunately, the same cannot be said about the women's field. Most of the top women racers are still recovering from the May 13 Olympic marathon trials or are entered in the L'Eggs Mini-Marathon, which will be held in New York City the day before the Classic.

"No strong women were available," said Szefc. "But there is always the possibility we could add somebody at the last minute."

Joan Benoit was the first woman finisher in last year's Classic. She is resting following her victory at the Olympic marathon trials and knee surgery. Last year's runnerup, Anne Audain, who resides in New Zealand, is entered in the L'Eggs Mini-Marathon.







Each Pee-Wee race will start at the gate at which the 10K runners enter the fairgrounds and will race to the 10K finish line.

The first three runners in each age group will be awarded a ribboned medallion.

The youngsters may not have the speed and stamina of the older runners, but they promise to generate just as much excitement when they speed to the finish line.

If too many runners in any age group appear at the starting line the judges may split the runners in heats. The first three finishers in each heat will be awarded a prize.




